Disability hate crime is when you're bullied because of being a disabled person.

A disabled person can be someone with...

- A physical impairment
- A sensory impairment (e.g. sight or hearing)
- A mental health issue
- A long-term health condition (over 12 months)
 - Autism or Asperger's
 - A learning disability

- Speak to the bus company.
- Keep your bus ticket or ask the driver for a ticket. It will show which bus you were on and when.
- Write down what happened.
- Write down the bus number or the bus number plate.
- Contact a disability hate crime agency, if you have one in your area.

Be careful about what you write and share online.


Don't write something about someone that isn't true, or that they wouldn't want you to share.

If you see it happening or if it happens to you...


Keep any nasty messages you've received as proof.
